Enabling Provisions

Confirmation - Art 44 CRPD International agreements – Art 218 TFEU (ex Art 300 TEC)

Dates

Before December 2006 – Ad Hoc Committee negotiations 30 March 2007 – signature 26 November 2009 – conclusion authorisation from Council 23 December 2010 – deposit of formal instrument of confirmation 22 January 2011 – entry into force for EU Reservation – Art 27 CRPD, armed forces

Legal Basis

Article 13 TEC – non-discrimination (now Art 19 TFEU)
Article 95 TEC – internal market (now Art 114 TFEU)
Article 300(2) TEC – international agreements (now Art 218 TFEU)

Status of CRPD in EU Law

Integral Part of EU Law – no need for transposition action Between primary and secondary EU law --IATA v Department for Transport 2006

--Kadi and Al Barakaat International Foundation v Council of the EU 2008

EU Competence

Statement – Article 44(1) CRPD Council decision 2009 – Annex Not static

EU Exclusive Competence

Council decision 2009 - explicit

- state aid
- common custom tariffs,
- ≠ EU public administration (eg recruitment, remuneration, training)

Council decision 2009 - illustrative Acts

EU and MS Shared Competence

Council decision 2009

- discrimination,
- equal pay for male and female workers,
- free movement of goods, persons, services and capital
- transport,
- taxation,
- internal market,
- agriculture
- ♣ Trans-European policy and statistics,

EU policies Identified as Relevant to the CRPD

2009 Council Decision - eg

- support for co-ordinated strategy on employment
- support for co-ordinated strategy on quality of education
- development co-operation policy with third countries

Direct Effect of CRPD Provisions?

ECJ/CJEU caselaw

- Whether provision sufficiently unconditional and precise to have direct effect Unlikely
